BRIDGING THE GAP BETWEEN THE HOME AND THE CLASSROOM With

There aren't many people outside of family who will spend as much time with your child than their preschool teacher does. With that in mind, it pays to have a positive relationship with the person who will be pouring into our children when they're not in our care.

Here are a few things you can do to bridge the gap between the home and classroom.

- Ask your child questions. The best way to engage your child is to ask open-ended, clarifying questions about their day. Their answers will not only give you insight into what happened when you were apart from each other, but will also give you something to talk about with their teacher.
- Read what teachers send home. Teachers send emails so parents can keep up to date on what's happening with their child. Read this! Not only will it keep you in the loop, but it will also allow you to have a more rich conversation with your kid about their school life.

- Give teachers feedback. As parents, we're quick to send feedback when something goes wrong. But how often do we send feedback when things go well? Send a quick email or text to your child's teacher telling them how much you appreciate something small they did this week in your child's classroom.

For the sake of your child, make every effort to partner with their teacher, support their efforts, and appreciate their investment. It can make more of a difference than you think.
